EDITOR'S COMMENTS

This month Chapter 78 is very fortunate to have Dr. Eric V. Larson, PhD., of RAND Corporation as our Guest Speaker. Dr. Larson is a senior policy researcher who specializes in irregular warfare, jihadist strategy, ideology and has worked with Special Forces at high echelon levels.

As stated at www.rand.org, "RAND Corpo-

ration is a nonprofit institution that helps improve policy and decision making through research and analysis." For over six decades RAND has used rigorous fact-based research and analysis to help international and military affairs as well as other interest groups.

Special Forces (Green Berets) have a long association with RAND Corporation and one of these individuals was Dr. George K. Tanham, PhD. Dr. Tanham received his BA from Princeton University in 1943 and then joined the U.S. Army serving as an officer in the European Theater under General Patton. He was decorated with a Silver Star with oak leaf cluster, Purple Heart, Air Medal and the French Croix de Guerre. Following the war, George Tanham completed his education, receiving a MA and PhD. from Stanford University. He then joined the Faculty of California Institute of Technology as a professor teaching Military History until 1955 when he joined RAND.

Dr. Tanham published his first book in 1961, *Communist Revolutionary Warfare: The Vietminh in Indochina*, which was to become a landmark for C.I. Warfare specialists. He served as Assistant Director of the Agency of International Development in Saigon, Vietnam from 1964 to 1965.

In 1968, Dr. Tanham was appointed by the Department of State with the rank of Minister as Special Assistant for Counterinsurgency at the U.S. Embassy in Bangkok, Thailand. In that role he set U.S. Counterinsurgency Policy, coordinated the C.I. effort, approved C.I. Programs and provided C.I. evaluation and reports to the Ambassador and Washington, D.C. Many of these programs were carried out by Company D, 1st SFG(A) and subsequently the 46th SF Company (Airborne). One of these programs was the Counterinsurgency Operations for the Royal Thai Police, that was taught by members of A-4624 out of Camp Cha Haw, Thailand.

During his long career Dr. Tanham authored several other books in his field and numerous documents, continuing to garner academic accolades. He co-authored with Douglas S. Blaufarb: *Who Will Win a Key; An Answer to the Puzzle of Revolutionary War.*

Dr. Tanham spent the rest of his career at the prestigious RAND rising thru the ranks becoming corporate vice president in charge of the Washington office and trustee from 1971 until 1982. \clubsuit



COUNTERINSURGENCY OPERATIONS FOR ROYAL THAI POLICE OFFICERS CLASS OF JANUARY 1968

Special Forces Detachment A-4624, 46th Special Forces Company (Airborne) established a training base at Police Camp Chaw Haw in November 1967, taught a cadre of Thai Police Officers and provided instruction to over 100 Royal Thai Police Officers selected from through out Thailand's districts involved in communist suppression.

The course proved to be a huge success with the Thai Police and U.S. Special Forces cadre continued providing instruction and support until the eventual withdrawal of US Special Forces from Thailand; the course was then institutionalized by the Thai National Police until the mid 1980's when it was discontinued. Subsequently a Counterinsurgency Library and Museum was establish at the base and contains SF instructional materials, photographs and memorabilia from our efforts to support Thailand in their counterinsurgency efforts.*

IN MEMORIAM MSG (E-8) ARMANDO (PAPPY) VALDEZ MAY 22, 1925 – FEBRUARY 16, 2014



MSG (E-8) Armando (Pappy) Valdez was born May 22, 1925 and died February 16, 2014 at his home in Santa Ana, California, after a long bout with respiratory and heart illnesses.

Pappy joined the army on September 1, 1943. He received his basic and airborne training at Fort Benning, Georgia . He was assigned to the 17th Airborne Division and saw combat in the Ardennes during the Battle of the Bulge in WWII where he was wounded. After recovering from his wounds he was assigned to the 508 Parachute Infantry Regiment, 82d Airborne Division.

He joined a Special Forces Reserve Unit in San Pedro, California in 1962 when it was Detachment 1, Co B, 17th SFGA which became Company C, 3rd Battalion, 12th Special Forces Group (Airborne). He remained with the unit until his 60th Birthday when he retired from SF and the US Army.

His awards include the Combat Infantryman's Badge, Master Parachutist, Purple Heart, European Campaign Medal with 3 Bronze Service Stars, and numerous reserve awards and decorations while serving with C-3-12.

Services were held at St. Anne Catholic Church, Santa Ana, CA. Internment followed at the Riverside National Cemetery.

DIRECTIONS TO CHAPTER 78 SHOOTOUT


Drive North on I-5 and exit at Templin Hwy

Exit at Templin Hwy – Turn right at bottom of exit ramp – Then make a quick left turn onto Paradise Ranch Road. Drive about two hundred yards on Paradise Ranch Rd
