

UNCLASSIFIED INTEL

On 30 November 2010, a 39-year-old Pakistani national named Muhammed Ather "Tony" Butt was detained with his Thai girl-friend, Sirikalya Kitbamrung, as they were crossing into Laos from the north-eastern Thai province of Nong Khai. Later that same day, officers from Thailand's Department of Special Investigations arrested a second Pakistani, Zezan Azzan Butt, 27, in the Rat Burana district of Bangkok. At about the same time, on the other side of the globe, Spanish police were swooping on a series of addresses in Barcelona, arresting six Pakistanis and one Nigerian.

The <u>raids</u> were the culmination of a major joint operation, code named Alpha, between Thai and Spanish investigators, prompted by the discovery that a suspected member of the al-Qaida inspired terror cell responsible for several attacks in Madrid – including the 2004 M-11 train bombings, which killed 191 people and left 1,800 injured – was travelling on a false passport.

Information from that suspect would lead, several years later, to the arrest in September 2009 of an Iranian-born Briton, Ahboor Rambarak Fath, at Bangkok's Suvarnabhumi airport – and, eventually, to Tony Butt. Stopped as he got off a flight from Spain, Fath was carrying a bag of 103 stolen European, Canadian and Israeli passports destined, he confessed, for the veritable "small forgery factory" that police found at Butt's apartment in the hours after his arrest.

In one room of the flat, an unnamed DSI agent told the Bangkok Post, officers discovered computers, a high-definition scanner and printer, and more than 1,000 stolen passports, photographs and counterfeit data pages for EU, Canadian, Chinese and Israeli passports, plus assorted sets of US and Schengen visa stickers and stamps.

Butt was, in the words of DSI deputy director-general Narat Savetnant, "the kingpin" of a major international gang that stole and falsified passports and then sold them to international criminal groups involved in arms trafficking, <u>human trafficking</u>, illegal immigration – and terrorism. Beside the Madrid bombers, the gang also allegedly supplied passports to the Pakistan-based Lashkar-e-Taiba group, accused of plotting the 2008 Mumbai attacks that left 164 people dead and more than 300 injured, and to Tamil Tiger separatists in Sri Lanka.


Theft of passports in Thailand – and particularly in Phuket – are a 'regular occurrence'

There is, of course, no evidence that Malaysia Airlines Flight MH370, which disappeared Friday 7 March just over an hour into its flight from Kuala Lumpur, Malaysia to Beijing, was the victim of a terror attack. But news that two of the passengers on the flight were travelling on passports stolen in Thailand – one belonging to Italian Luigi Maraldi, who lost it last August when he left it as collateral for a motorbike rented in Phuket, and the other to Austrian Christian Kozel, who reported his lost in the same area some 18 months earlier – has focused attention on the country's booming trade in stolen and falsified passports.

Some, certainly, have ended up in the hands of terrorists. In June 2012, the month that Butt was sentenced to 15 years in jail, the DSI smashed another major counterfeiting syndicate, this one accused of issuing some 3,000 falsified passports and visas over the five years of its existence, two of them to Iranians convicted of carrying out a series of botched bomb attacks in Bangkok in February 2012, supposedly aimed at Israeli diplomats. (Iranian-born Seyed Paknejad, 45, the counterfeiting gang's alleged ringleader, was arrested but jumped bail and fled, on a fake Turkish passport, to Malaysia – where he was re-arrested last year carrying a startling 17 stolen New Zealand passports. Thailand has subsequently asked for his extradition.) (continued on page 4)

The gangs have targeted Thailand mainly because of the very large numbers of European, US and Australian tourists who travel there every year. But the Bangkok Post's interview with an unnamed DSI agent quoted him as saying the country was also attractive because it is relatively easy to enter and leave; "you can negotiate with some law enforcement people"; and - importantly - some local officials have not tended to see the forgery of foreign (as opposed to Thai) passports as a particularly serious offence.

The business reportedly originated in the early 80s, when Thai criminal gangs employed hotel staff, tour guides and sex workers to steal not just tourists' traveller's cheques but also their passports, without which cheques could not be

cashed. Once credit cards started replacing traveller's cheques, the gangs used the expertise they had already gained in the sophisticated techniques of document falsification to become fullservice fake document providers, importing passports, driving licences and ID cards from abroad, doctoring them, and selling to anyone prepared to pay.

CHAPTER 78 HONORED BY SPECIAL GUEST SPEAKER

Dr. Eric V. Larson, PhD. of RAND Corporation was our guest speaker at our April 12th meeting. Dr. Larson is a highly respected expert on world terrorism organizations. He presented a very technical, enlightening and entertaining discussion on the past, present and future of

the continued global war on terrorism. He is a senior policy researcher at the RAND Corporation and a professor at the PAEDEE RAND Graduate School. Dr. Larson mesmerized a packed house of Chapter 78 members for over an hour and fielded many varied questions on terrorism.

Dr. Larson covered the most known terrorist groups, especially al-Qaeda and its emergence, fracturing, squabbles, and recent set-backs. Al-Qaeda is just one of many jihadist groups all over the world. Many of these groups have fought each other for centuries and continue to do so today.

Africa is a present hot spot for many of these groups. Al-Shabab has been very active in high profile attacks like the Kenya mall massacre and other activities in Kenya. Somalia is another country with several organized terror groups, followed by the Philippines, Pakistan, and other countries. Yemen seems to presently be the most popular country for terrorists to do their training and for staging for attacks.


One of the more interesting and recent events concerned the fear of a terrorist attack at the recent Winter Olympics in Sochi, Russia. The news media played on this real threat for weeks, while the Russians quietly prevented it. Dr. Larson's comment on the threat was simple: "Russia capped the leader". The threat went away.

There are many different extremist threats to the United States and our allies from hundreds of splintered groups that continually change their tactics and organizations like chameleons. To combat these threats, countries are collaborating more and there have been some major successes. This must continue.

The number one fear of terrorist groups are drone attacks which have been very effective as they evolve in accuracy that limit unwanted causalities. The methods of communication by terrorists have drastically changed from electronic messaging to "snail mail" and couriers. Anti terrorism groups have had to adjust to this old method of communication and coordination.

Since 9/11 there has been a tremendous increase in international collaboration to combat terrorism and to prepare recovery methods on a global level. These threats will be with us for a long time. Anti terrorist work will be needed for years to come. It has shaped itself much like the long Cold War era.

Of special interest to Chapter 78 is the on-going war on terrorism by Special Operations Forces worldwide. This is one of the key parts of combating these many and varied anti-Western groups. This requires our ability to stay ahead in our training, technical resources, vigilance, and commitment to support Special Forces.

Home grown terrorism and copycats are different and more complex. Dr. Larson discussed the need for our citizens to help by being alert, vigilant and be prepared for emergencies. Get some training in emergency responder techniques. Stay united. Share information. Homeland Security is here to stay and is truly global. U.S. Special Forces and other Special Operations units have made a difference in blunting some attacks and are improving to combat terrorism.
